A Prayer for those who are grieving at Christmas:



Your guide to Advent Good Shepherd Parish

What is Advent?

Advent is *traditionally* a season of *hopeful waiting* and *preparation* for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas as well as a *joyful* time awaiting the return of Jesus at the second coming.

TRADITION UP-HELD

Wreath and Candles: We use symbols of old, to advertise the season—symbols such as the Advent Wreath and colourful candles which speak of the significance of the season. The Advent Wreath was designed many centuries ago, to help children wait patiently for Christmas. Each Sunday had a large candle and each weekday had a smaller candle. The candles were placed in a circle and one was lit each day. Today, our Advent Wreath contains four candles, each one representing one of the four Sundays of Advent. In the centre of the circle is a fifth candle (traditionally white), the Christ Candle, which is lit on Christmas Day. The Christ candle is coloured white because this is the traditional colour of feast days in the Western Church. In many Catholic churches, the most popular colours for the four surrounding Advent candles are violet and rose, corresponding with the colours of the liturgical vestments for the Sundays of Advent.



The Jesse Tree: Jesse Trees are a very old Christmas Tradition and first started in medieval times. They are a great way to help tell the story of the Bible from creation to the Christmas Story. Each week the Children's Liturgy group will cover a story from The Gospels of Advent, and decorate their Jesse tree with thoughts from the Children about the life of Jesus. Our CIA Youth will also contribute.

The tree is symbolised by a branch—a branch is a sign of new life and new beginnings. Jesus was a descendent of King David and Christians believe that Jesus is this new branch.

Advent Calendars: You may wish to purchase Advent Calendars for your home. Or simply delight in the Parish Childrens' Liturgy celebration as they open up a new window each Sunday, focusing our thoughts and prayers on the themes of Hope, peace, Joy and Love. A terrific activity to prepare ourselves for the births of baby Jesus.

JOYFUL

Participation in the joyful occasions that Advent brings us, is a great way to prepare for the coming of our Saviour.

- Look for opportunities to join in Carols at our Parish, before each Christmas Mass and in our Community.
- Visit St Kieran's School for their Nativity play being held Tuesday 4th December at 8.30am All parishioners, family and friends are welcome.
- Visit St Joseph's School for their Nativity Pageant—at 8.40am on Friday 7th December.
- Share in the joy with special foods after each Mass. Stay for a cup of tea or coffee
 and chat with other parishioners and visitors to our Parish. You could bring a plate to
 share.
- The Council of Christian Churches are holding traditional Carols on Civic Centre Lawns on Sunday 23rd Time to be advised.

PRAYERFUL CELEBRATION

- You may notice our Mass liturgies during Advent include special prayers: prayers to the saints whose feast days fall in this time, especially St Anthony and St Nicholas. We invite you to pray to the Saints at this time.
- Advent Angel—which is a bit like Secret Santa. Our Parish plans to pray for those
 on our Sick list this Advent, and you are invited to be an Angel, draw a name from
 the basket and pray for that person. You may like to take a few names, or take a
 different name each week. Your prayers are needed for those suffering and in need.
 We have included prayers for the sick on the back of this booklet.



 On the back of this booklet, is a blessing that you can give at home, for your Christmas preparations, for sharing of your foods. In European countries, it is a tradition to bless the trees decorated in their homes—trees being a symbol of new life.

PREPARING OURSELVES

Advent is a season leading into a season of great joy and festivities—Christmas. The time before any great feast is often dotted with some form of restraint—as in Lent before Easter. So for Advent, we are invited to prepare ourselves in various ways.

- Penance—ask for Healing, this Advent. Our Parish is holding a Healing Mass on Thursdayth December at 7.30pm
- Confession—ask Fr Mick for special confession times
- Alms giving—by way of contributing to the poor, consider special donations this Christmas at any of our Advent masses and services. All items donated will be included in Hampers that we are preparing for our poor and needy families in the Mount Isa community.
- Gifts for baby Jesus—there is an empty cradle in our church. We hope you may like to donate a gift for "baby" to be placed in this cradle. The idea is to use the gifts for our young parents in Mount Isa. Symbolically buy a gift for baby Jesus, and in reality, you are helping all young parents who are in this time of waiting.
- We have Advent Reflections prepared for our Masses, for you to enjoy and reflect about what Advent means for you.
